With all the activity elsewhere in the past month, there doesn't SEEM to have been all that much going on at the SAC, but in reality, a fair amount of progress has been made. Recent teams at the SAC have cut the grass, mudded some drywall and advanced the electrical work. A minor oversight by our framing crew is being addressed too. The front entry coat and boot closet didn't get framed, so that is being done now.

Our logo will be proudly shown on the south side of the building, approximately 10 feet wide by 9 feet high. We will also have a sign facing the access road so drivers approaching our building will know who we are, and where to turn into our driveway.

Are you going to Oshkosh? If so, you are officially excused from the Saturday work crews at the SAC for the two Saturdays covered by AirVenture. We're all excused those days as I won't be there to see who does show up! Hope to see you all out in Oshkosh!

NEW RUNWAY CROSSING PROCEDURES

Beginning June 30, 2010, controllers will be required to issue explicit instructions to cross or hold short of each runway that intersects a taxi route.

“Taxi to” will no longer be used when issuing taxi instructions to an assigned take-off runway.

Instructions to cross a runway will be issued one at a time. Instructions to cross multiple runways will not be issued. An aircraft or vehicle must have crossed the previous runway before another runway crossing is issued.

This applies to any runway, including inactive or closed runways.

Changes will also be made to the Aeronautical Information Manual (AIM) and AIP to reflect the new procedures.

Never cross a hold line without explicit ATC instructions. If in doubt, ASK!

Reminder: You may not enter a runway *unless* you have been:

- * instructed to cross that specific runway;
- * cleared to take off from that runway; or
- * instructed to position and hold on that specific runway.

If you are a pilot and have children, you probably have given them a ride in a plane. You also probably hoped that one of them would be interested in flying and become a pilot. I've given my children 22 rides (I checked my log book), and none of them have shown an interest in becoming a pilot. This is discouraging when you think about it. But then I read an article by Budd Davisson in Plane and Pilot where he talks about giving his children rides in everything including his Pitts. He tells about his kids going to Oshkosh with him for 15 years. They could identify Mustangs, Pitts Specials and a variety of other planes. Both of his children have no serious interest in airplanes. My odds were much better. I have six children. Do any of you have a more positive experience? Or perhaps your parents are pilots and you learned from them? My parents were products of Lindbergh's time. They did take a plane ride from the Rochester airport when the terminal was on Scottsville Road side. They left me behind in the hands of a good friend just in case something happened. I remember my first ride in a DC-3 from New York City at the end of the war. That was WWII for you youngsters.

When I first visited the Air Force Museum in Dayton in 1984, there were only two hangars. This meant that the large aircraft were tied down outside. That was when I first saw the XB-70 Valkyrie. I fell in love with this aircraft. There were only two built. One was destroyed when a chase plane crashed into the tail of the bomber and both crashed. But the plane looks like the Concorde, with a long pointed nose.

LAST CHARTER MEMBER HELEN MOORE PASSES AT AGE 94 BY BILL SHAW

Helen Moore was, as long as I knew her, an excellent pilot and flight instructor. I met her back in the late 60's when she was a flight instructor at Canandaigua airport. Wally McCann was the field owner, operator and AI for the field. I had joined the old Canandaigua Flying Club where you could rent a Champ for \$7 per hour and a Cessna 150 for \$15 per hour including fuel. Helen had tried to convince me, at one point, to go to the Champ when funds were running low for me but I was in love with the 150 at that time. She was always ready for an explanation, criticism or praise when called for.

A few years ago, I tried to get Helen to come to our chapter meetings but she was afraid someone would ask her to give a speech. She apparently was shy when it came to getting up in front of a group.

In later years Helen and her husband Dayne, also a charter member ran Chapin airpark in the Canandaigua area. After her husband died, Helen moved to Victor to spend the summers and lived in Florida for the winters. I know she was flying back and forth between Florida and New York in the 90's.

Aviation has lost a great pilot and lover of aviation in Helen.
