He performed his energy management show flying a shrike Commander. He came down the runway, shut down both engines, did a 180 with a roll and came back down the runway landing on one wheel and then the other, coasting to a stop up on the ramp. In addition to flying at Oshkosh I saw him as lead plane for the unlimited race at Reno n his P-51. Always wore a Panama hat. He escaped a POW camp by stealing a Me-109. Surprised he wasn't shot down by friendly fire. He flew chaseplane for Yeager. Generally recognized at the best pilot ever.

The following may not do you any good if you have to make an off-airport landing, but it could win you some bar bets. Tom Knauff, well-known glider and sailplane instructor, writes a column for SOARING magazine. In the July 2016 issue he presents the following quiz: To judge your altitude, how low do you need to fly to see cows legs? A 1500 feet, B 1200 ft, C 800 ft, and D 500 ft. (I don't remember flying over any cows around here.

Tom's answer; C 800 feet. Sheep legs can only be seen at 500 ft. These and other objects can be helpful when making off-airport landings.

Fences are a problem. If the plane may be too low to fly over a wire fence on an off-field landing the pikot should: A try to fly directly over the fence post, B try to fly over the midpoint between two fence posts, C Increase airspeed and fly close to the ground, then zoom up and over the fence, and D Keep 4100 in your pocket to pay the farmer for an damage to his fence.

Tom's answer: A Try to fly directly over a fence post. You cannot see wires, but the post will be visible. If you land between posts the wires will act like a cheese slicer. Hit the normally small pole, knock it over, and hopefully fly right over it.

FOR SALE: Belite UltraCUB ultralight kit, never started. The UltraCUB is a derivative of the Kitfox Lite, by James Weibe of Belite Aircraft. It has the full span flaperons of the Kitfox series, and folding wings. This was one of the first models intended to use a 4 stroke ½ VW engine. It is of aluminum construction and is put together with pulled rivets. I paid \$7400 for it, including the \$400 option for lightweight lift struts. I am asking \$5500, or reasonable offer. 


